Our church has several steps to take before calling a new pastor

Pastoral transitions are a recurring phenomenon in the life of every congregation. True, some pastors stay for decades. That is rare; most stay considerably less than a decade. In fact, Barna Research reports that mainline congregations are served by the same pastor for only about 4 years.

Thom Ranier argues, "... as our research has shown consistently, longer tenure is needed for church health. Longer tenure does not guarantee church health, but a series of short-term pastorates is typically unhealthy."

This gets to the heart of interim ministry, and why I'm called to serve in this capacity. Most churches want a rapid turnaround of pastors. Frankly, it isn't spiritually healthy to do that. There are some matters that churches must settle before calling their next pastor. I'm here to help, advise, and consult about these important matters.

So, where are we? Right now, we're in the middle—the interim—of the pastor search process. Some even refer to this time using a biblical metaphor—the Wilderness Wanderings. It can be a time of confusion, no doubt. Remember how ". . . all the children of Israel murmured against Moses and against Aaron: and the whole congregation said to them, Would God that we had died in the land of Egypt, or, Would God that we had died in this wilderness" (Numbers 14:2). That was a major mistake. God heard their murmuring and gave them their desires. Rather than murmuring, let's turn to praying for our current leaders and our future pastor.

What should we do in this middle or interim period? While not exhaustive, let me mention a few matters:

1. THE LEADERS. Traditionally, that refers to two key leadership roles. The first, you've already done; for better or worse, you have an interim pastor—me. The second is to elect a Pastor Search Committee (see Bylaws of First Baptist Church of Castroville, Article V; Section A.1.a). You're not quite ready to bring someone to the church next month. The second step below is essential.

2. THE SELF-STUDY. The self-study tends to focus on two aspects of church life: One looks to our history and current situation seeking to identify where we stand. That's important since in today's fragmented Baptist denominational life, First Baptist Church of Castroville, must be able to say to any pastoral candidate, "This is the kind of Baptist Christians we are." Most pastoral candidates will want to know that, too. I would.

Two, and this one looks to the future, what kind of pastor do we need to lead this congregation in the years ahead? The typical response is, "We want God's man." Sure we do! But, God's men differ in giftedness and callings. Do we want a strong preacher, compassionate pastor, winsome evangelist, effective administrator? Of course! The problem is, we're not apt to find in one person ALL of those characteristics.

In order to locate God's man for this church, the Pastor Search Committee will need to hear from you. The best way to discover that is through a questionnaire designed to reflect the will of the congregation. That's important since, in Baptist life, the congregation is autonomous or self-governing. No agency or body directs us on what to do. We do it ourselves, through our own study of Scripture, regular and sincere prayer, and the witness of the Holy Spirit—individually and corporately. This information becomes the core of what the Pastor Search Committee will utilize when interviewing pastoral candidates and thus why it is essential to hear from everyone.

3. THE SEARCH. The search is carried out by the Pastor Search Committee. These are the people who, on the one hand, you've entrusted to seek, find, and bring before the congregation your next pastor. The committee, on the other hand, owes you as a congregation the fidelity to find someone who best "matches" what the congregation prayerfully said the church needs.

How long does it take? There's absolutely no way to gauge that. Sometimes, it may take only a couple of months; other times, it may take longer. The key is for neither the committee nor the church to rush. Be patient with God's Holy Spirit. Further, the Spirit may be waiting on the church to make some needed changes within. It is patently not fair to hold off on making some of these changes until "the new pastor arrives." Why would we want to task him to do this or do that, knowing that whatever decision he makes, a good number of his new members will not like it or him? Make the hard changes now. Again, that's part of the reason I'm here.

4. THE CALL. Finally, the Pastor Search Committee has prayerfully and carefully found the single person they believe God is calling to FBC-Castroville. By this time, they will likely have reviewed hundreds of candidates. They should always stay within the bounds established by the self-study. Someone may ask, "What if they find someone they like who doesn't fit into those bounds?" My advice is, do not consider that person. Why not? Because, in the self-study, the church prayerfully described the person they wanted. God's Spirit spoke through the congregation; the committee should honor that.

The committee then will bring the pastoral candidate to the church field. Probably, we will want to host a Saturday evening get acquainted time. Then, on Sunday, he will preach and a vote will be taken. The results are announced to the candidate and to the church. At that point, it is up to the candidate to accept the call or decline. Most of the time, the response on both is positive. Finally, you're about to get out of the Wilderness and into the Promised Land!

This is a difficult period. You want someone and you want him now! Please do your best to avoid that. Most people don't want to rush into the purchase of a home, the selection of a job, or covenanting with a spouse for a lifetime. Calling a pastor isn't much different.

There's no better Scripture for this period than Psalm 27:14: "Wait for the LORD; be strong, and let your heart take courage; wait for the LORD!"

Be part of 4th of July Parade

On the night before (July 3), we will meet in the Fellowship Hall to remove the Ozarka labels from the 8-oz. bottles and replace them with our labels. Then we'll place them in coolers (please let us borrow your medium or large coolers!) that night to be loaded with ice and placed on the float and in the truck the next morning.

We also need volunteers to help Children's Minister Debra McDonel decorate the float to promote VBS.

If you want to get into the patriotic mood, plan to come to the church at 7 p.m. Wednesday, July 3, and join us in the Fellowship Hall to help decorate the float and prepare the water hottles.

If you want to ride on the float or walk beside it, wear some patriotic colors, sunscreen, a hat or visor, and comfortable shoes. Watch for more details in the bulletin as we get near July!
