# Pastor Search process to include prayer in homes

The Pastor Search Committee is actively engaged in the search process for our next senior pastor. We would like to share with you some things we have accomplished, what we are currently working on, and what we will be doing in the near future.

In October we held a church-wide Heritage Event to reflect on meaningful past church events in the lives of our members. A church-wide Vision 2020 and Beyond Event was held in November to share current ministries we want to continue and possible areas of ministry to consider for the future.

Currently, we are developing a Church Profile with area and church demographics that can be shared with prospective pastor candidates. We are also working on a Pastor Profile that the committee will use as a guide when considering pastoral candidates. The church-wide Prospective Pastor Survey was just completed and the committee will soon analyze the results. So far, 73 surveys have been received and we expect a few more to be submitted soon. We want to thank everyone for participating in providing this vital information to the committee.

In January and February, the church will be invited to attend cottage prayer meetings in homes. We will be praying specifically for our church, for the new pastor and his family that God is preparing, and for the Pastor Search Committee as we continue to seek God's direction during the search process. The January prayer meeting will be on Jan. 20 from 7 to 8 p.m. We will meet in the homes of Michael and Jo Anna Franke and Larry and Serena Bull. In February, we will meet in the home of Ace and Linda Rifenburgh and another home yet to be determined. Please watch for additional information and a sign-up sheet. In March, we plan to post the job announcement and start receiving resumes. Then the task of reviewing resumes, identifying potential candidates, and sending out questionnaires will begin.

# The Essential Controller of a Person's Life

Thomas Friedman's bestseller, *The World is Flat,* discusses the enormous technological and communication changes taking place across the globe even as I write this column. The "flat world" is Friedman's term for globalization, how people in Bangor, Maine, can do business with people in Bangalore, India, effortlessly and with little cost. It's a great read, especially for people like me who know very little about "how" all this technology came about.

But what Friedman discloses can be frightening and, at times, down-right silly. Take for example, his tour of the Japanese cell phone company NTT Do-CoMo. DoCoMo is the predominant mobile phone operator in Japan. <a href="https://www.nttdocomo.co.jp/english/">https://www.nttdocomo.co.jp/english/</a>.

The name is officially an abbreviation of the phrase, "do communications over the mobile network," and is also from a compound word *dokomo*, meaning "everywhere" in Japanese. And do they mean it!

DoCoMo understands that in the business world, people use computers, often a company-owned laptop. In their private lives, however, "they base their lifestyles on a mobile phone." One DoCoMo executive put it like this: "We believe that the mobile phone will become the essential controller of a person's life."

I paused when I read that sentence. "We believe that the mobile phone will become the essential controller of a person's life." He may be correct in a technologically-focused society.

But, not for the Christian—even the most technologically savvy one. The essential controller of the Christian person's life is none other than Jesus Christ. Paul, the master interpreter of Jesus, explained it to the Colossians:

6 So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live in him, 7 rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness (Col 2:6-7).

We who have trusted in Jesus as Savior are to "continue to live in him." There is in the Christian life, a day-by-day, year-by-year commitment to Jesus. As the new year of 2020 is upon us, make sure that Jesus is the essential controller of your life day in and day out! With Him, it's bound to be a great year!
